# Scouts require learning how to confront bullies

DALLAS — As far as the Boy Scouts of America is concerned, knowing how to confront a bully is now as important as mastering a slip knot.

For the first time in the 97year history of the nation's largest youth organization, newcomers must show they have learned Scout-approved ways to avoid being pushed around and called names, if they want to advance through the ranks.

Shaken down for your lunch money? Tell the bully how it hurts. Called a crater face? The 2008 Boy Scout Handbook recommends this comeback: "So what if I have a face full of zits. What's it to you?"

"We've always emphasized bullying — how to recognize it, how to prevent it," said Jim Terry, assistant chief executive of the Boy Scouts. "This is just a reinforcement of those principles."

The Scouts say the move Boy Scouts have even publish isn't in response to increased a comic book on the subject.

bullying in their ranks. But some critics are already picking on the organization for its new curriculum.

"I don't see it as radically changing anything," said John Dandurand, executive director of Creating Caring Communities, a nonprofit based in Denver that advises schools on ways to discourage bullying.

"It's just a set of things to memorize," said Dandurand, who as a youth attained the rank of Eagle Scout. "Those of us who were adept at memorizing got more merit badges."

The 472-page Boy Scouts Handbook devotes a half-page to bullies, and Scouts are required to discuss the material with a troop leader to reach the beginner rank of Tenderfoot.

Terry said the measures help reinforce personal safety lessons the Boy Scouts have taught all along. Bullying has long been the subject of informal troop leader talks, and the Boy Scouts have even published a comic book on the subject.

The handbook also now covers cyberbullying. Aspiring Scouts must demonstrate they know how to show restraint when taunted online.

Terry pointed to the suicide of a 13-year-old Missouri girl who hanged herself in October 2006 after falling victim to an online hoax in which she thought she was corresponding with a boy who didn't really exist.

"That was not a trigger, but it proves we're on the right track," Terry said. "Her death speaks specifically to what we're trying to prevent."

Dorothy Espelage, a professor of educational psychology at the University of Illinois, credited the Boy Scouts for mandating the lessons. But she had hoped the material would also have some advice for Scouts who might sometimes bully others.

"You know that some of these Boy Scouts are bullies, and that they're ringleaders," Espelage said. "Why do we always put it on the victim to change their behavior?"

# Graduation tests divide educators

HARRISBURG — Pennsylvania school administrators are divided over whether highschool students should have to pass a series of state-sanctioned tests to graduate.

They discussed the proposed graduation standards at a hearing Wednesday before a panel of the State Board of Education. The board plans to adopt the rules on Jan. 17, beginning a regulatory review that could take a year to complete before the proposal becomes official.

The regulations call for students to pass tests covering English, math, science and social studies during their high school years. They would replace traditional final exams, starting with the class of 2014. Schools would have to provide remedial help for failing students and give them opportunities to retake the tests.

The state would create 10 subject-specific "graduation competency assessments" to measure students' graduation readiness. Students would need to pass six to graduate.

Some administrators echoed objections by the Pennsylvania School Boards Association and the Pennsylvania State Education Association, the state's largest teachers' union, saying that the new testing system would impose an exceedingly narrow set of graduation standards on students.

Richard Gusick, a strategic planning administrator for the Tredyffrin-Easttown School District in Chester County, said traditional standardized testing alone cannot measure whether students are ready for college or careers.

Most students can demonstrate their graduation readiness by passing the 11thgrade Pennsylvania System of School Assessment, or PSSA, tests already mandated by the state, Gusick said. Those who cannot are allowed to use alternative assessments such as hands-on demonstrations, portfolios and oral presenta-

MATH: Algebra I and II, geometry; pass any two.

ENGLISH: English composition and literature; pass both. SCIENCE: Biology, chemistry; pass either.

In the Chester Upland School District, one of the state's most impoverished systems, only 20 percent of the most recent graduating class went on to college, and the vast majority had to complete remedial courses before they could enroll, school superintendent Gregory Thornton said.

"Certainly as we are somewhat fearful of high-stakes testing, I'm fearful of a highstakes world that our youngsters will not be prepared for," Thornton said.

The new testing system is one of a dozen recommendations made by a commission formed by Gov. Ed Rendell to strengthen the state's graduation standards.

Daniel W. Fogarty, the commission's co-chairman and a personnel executive with Carpenter Technology Corp. in Reading, said the testing requirements would ensure that prospective employees possess strong basic skills.

"We want to know that if a prospective employee has graduated from a Pennsylvania high school, he or she can read, write, compute and solve problems at a competitive level," Fogarty said.

onstrate their graduation readiness by passing the 11thgrade Pennsylvania System of School Assessment, or PSSA, tests already mandated by the state, Gusick said. Those who cannot are allowed to use alternative assessments such as hands-on demonstrations, portfolios and oral presentations, he said.

"Using a myriad of these strategies, our teachers are able to determine proficiency levels that may not be accurately reflected on an impersonal exam," Gusick said.

The regulations also would force students in vocational programs to spend more time taking college preparatory courses they ordinarily would not need for a diploma, said Jacqueline Cullen, the executive director of the Pennsylvania Association of Career and Technical Administrators.

"To compare, colleges do not disenfranchise English majors because they do not take the same high levels of mathematics taken by engineering students," Cullen said.

Other school leaders supported the new rules, saying they would ensure that all stu-

ecuve employees possess strong basic skills.

Some school districts have already made passing the PSSA a high-school graduation requirement. But students in other districts have the option of passing the PSSA or a locally designed test that measures how well they meet state standards under current regulations.

Districts that offer their own tests are not required to seek state approval to ensure those exams are equivalent to the PSSA. Critics say that raises questions about whether all graduates are meeting the state's academic standards.

Under the proposed rules, students could demonstrate proficiency in a given subject by passing the PSSA; a graduation competency assessment; a local exam approved by companies that evaluate educational tests; or an Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate exam.
