

# House OKs consitutional amendment for larger possible tax cuts

HARRISBURG - A constitutional amendment to permit elimination of homeowners' property taxes advanced out of the state House of Representatives on Thursday, but it still faces a long road ahead.

The proposal would expand a provision in the state constitution that allows a 50 percent cut in property taxes for people's primary homes. The amendment would let the Legislature eliminate such taxes, while keeping taxes in place for businesses and other commercial properties.

to emerge from the House as

members searched this week for ways to cut school taxes. The other, which also passed unanimously Thursday, would give tax breaks to working poor while cutting the state's personal income tax by about \$1 billion a year.

The constitutional amendment would need to pass the Senate this year and then get another round of approval by the Legislature in the 2009-10 session before going to state voters for a referendum.

Despite its unanimous passage, some Republicans criticized the bill for not requiring - rather than simply allowing - larger property-tax cuts or The bill was one of two items for not eliminating property taxes of all kinds.

"It's a borderline joke is what it is," said Rep. Will Gabig, R-Cumberland, "It will do nothing. It will not reduce property taxes by one dollar. It will not change the system at all."

The sponsor, Rep. David Levdansky, D-Allegheny, said it will cost the state \$5.5 billion to eliminate property taxes for primary residences or farms, and an additional \$5 billion to get rid of the tax entirely, including businesses and commercial properties.


'If you can put up the votes to raise 10-and-a-half billion dollars, we could do it today,' Levdansky said. "But if you can't do that, then we've got to amend the constitution under the process that I've laid out."

The House also approved a bill to establish an earned income-tax credit, legislation that was amended on the floor Wednesday to cut a myriad of other taxes, including those on income, cell phones, business profits, inheritances and pet adoptions.

The House adjourned until the week of Jan. 28, when it is expected to take up bills that would reduce property taxes but make up the revenues with increased sales or income taxes.

## Nurses face criminal charges after quitting jobs caring for terminally ill children

RIVERHEAD, N.Y. - For months, the nurses complained that they were subject to demeaning and unfair working conditions - not what they were promised when they came to America from the Philippines in search of a better life. So they abruptly quit.

But in doing so, they put more than their careers at risk: Prosecutors hit them with criminal charges for allegedly jeopardizing the lives of terminally ill children they were in charge of watching.

The 10 nurses and the attorney who advised them were charged with conspiracy and child endangerment in what defense attornevs say is an unprecedented use of criminal law in a labor dispute. If convicted of the misdemeanor offenses, they face up to a year in jail on each of 13 counts, and could lose their nursing licens-

es and be deported.

The case has unfolded against the backdrop of a chronic nursing shortage in the United States. All of the defendants were from the Philippines, which exported 120,000 nurses last year.

One defendant was a doctor back home and a top scorer on the country's medical board exams, but decided it was more lucrative to be a nurse in the United States. Others had respectable

viewed their work in New York as a dream come true.

"Coming to the United States is like the fulfillment of your nursing career," said Maria Theresa Ramos, who arrived on Long Island in 2004.

The nurses are backed by several Filipino organizations in the U.S., as well as both the New York and California state nurses associations, which fear prosecuting nurses who quit their jobs could set a bad precedent.

Prosecutors say the nurses' resignations — without notice — on April 7, 2006, jeopardized the lives of children at Avalon Gardens in Smithtown, where some of the patients are on ventilators and required constant monitoring.

None of the patients suffered ill effects, but an indictment alleges that the nurses knew their sudden resignations would make it difficult to find replacements. Their trial is scheduled to begin Jan. 28.

The nurses say they were Avalon Gardens.

Attorneys for the 10 nurses say one of the nurses remained on-duty when resignation letters were submitted. They insist that the nurse — Ramos stayed four hours past the scheduled end of her shift to ensure that the patients received proper care.

The nurses contend that they are facing prosecution because influential Democratic officials Sen. Charles Schumer and Suffolk County District Attorney Thomas Spota — took interest in the case at the behest of an attorney for Sentosa Health Care, which operates

# Ag. Dept. loosens rule for 'hormone free' milk labels

Pennsylvania Agriculture Department announced Thursday that it was loosening a rule that would have prevented dairies from labeling milk as free from artificial growth hormones.

The labeling rule drew a backlash from producers and marketers who said they wanted to give customers a choice, and the state agency responded by allowing such claims as long as a disclaimer accompanies it.

The disclaimer must say that no significant difference has been shown between milk derived from cows treated with artificial growth hormones and other milk.

The state also will require milk producers who use the label to certify that artificial growth hormones were not used so the claims can be checked by the Agriculture Department.

A spokesman for Gov. Ed Rendell said the new rule aims for a balance.

"The governor had a broader perspective than the Department of Agriculture and wanted to be sure that the labels were accurate and informative and served the needs of both consumers and producers,"

Dennis C. Wolff had argued that calling milk free from artificial hormones inaccurately implied that other milk was unsafe.

"We allow those labels all the time," said Michael Hansen, a senior scientist with Consumers Union in Yonkers, N.Y. "'No artificial colors,' for example, 'no artificial flavors.' Those are not considered misleading."

The product rBST, or recombinant bovine somatotropin, is sold by St. Louis-based Monsanto Co. under the brand name Posilac. A company spokesman did not return a phone message seeking comment.

Consumer demand has fueled increasing use of the "artificial "rBST-free" or growth hormone free" labels on milk.
