

ORLEANS NEW (AP) - Al Copeland, who became rich selling spicy fried chicken and notorious for his flamboyant lifestyle, died Sunday at a clinic near Munich, Germany. He was 64.

The founder of the Popeyes Famous Fried Al Copeland Chicken chain had

Thanksgiving with a malignant salivary gland tumor. His death was announced by his spokeswoman, Kit Wohl.

After growing up in New Orleans, Copeland sold his car at age 18 for enough money to open his own one-man doughnut shop. He went on to spend 10 modestly successful years in the doughnut business.

The opening of a Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurant in New Orleans in 1966, however, caught Copeland's eye. Inspired by KFC's success, Copeland in 1971 used his doughnut profits

to open a restaurant, Chicken on the Run. ("So fast you get your chicken before you get your change.")

After six months, Chicken on the Run was still losing money. In a last-ditch effort, Copeland chose a spicier Louisiana Cajun-style recipe and reopened

been diagnosed shortly before the restaurant under the name Popeyes Mighty Good Fried Chicken, after Popeye Doyle, Gene Hackman's character in the film "The French Connection." The chain that grew from the one restaurant became Popeyes Famous Fried Chicken.

In its third week of operation, Copeland's revived chicken restaurant broke the profit

Franchising began in 1976, growing the chain to more than 800 stores in the United States and several foreign countries by 1989.

I think the idea is a wise one because you want different perspectives all coming together to make the determi-

DP: If you were president, what would you have done with Bear Sterns?

Clinton: Well, I think the Treasury and the Fed did the best they could under the circumstances to try to stem a much more serious liquidity crisis, but what I fault the president for - he really hasn't been as engaged as he should be given the dimensions of the economic crisis we're facing.

I would be much more visible and working with my economic advisers, with the leaders of Congress, trying to figure out what the next steps are, because I personally don't think the action regarding Bear Stearns is adequate. It's not only that we have to pay attention to what's happening on Wall Street; we have to pay attention to what's happening on Main Street, and I don't think we can work our way out of this economic challenge

without focusing on the home foreclosure crisis. I've been making recommendations for a year, and I would wish, if I were elected president, I had a chance to actually implement some of those recommenda-DP: The tone of the cam-

paign in recent weeks has obviously been escalated by surrogates and campaigns. The tone, right now - do you feel it will be helpful for Democrats once you have a nominee going up against John McCain? Or do you need to go back to the days where we had the California debate and everybody seemed to be getting along despite any policy differences you (and Obama)

Clinton: I think overall this has been a very civil and positive campaign. There are real differences, and we both have brought millions of people into this process who are very passionate about their opinions. I certainly have tried, and I have certainly spoken out about the need to keep it civil and positive, but there are differences. So we've got to draw those differences, which I think are important for voters, and we have to keep moving forward with these various contests.
