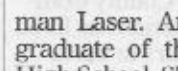

Move toward community building

Samuel J. Bressi is coming across the river.

The newly hired president and chief executive officer of the Lancaster County Community Foundation has lived for a dozen years in York.

But he's aiming for full immersion here.

Bressi said "getting the lay of the land" was his first goal as he wound up his debut week at 53 W. James St.

The schedule — "lots of meals with lots of people," Bressi said — will continue this week during lunch with Mayor Rick Gray and Lisa Riggs, executive director of the James Street Improvement District.

Then comes the heavy lifting.

The philanthropic foundation, having quietly supported numerous charitable and civic organizations for most of its 84-year history, has been reinventing itself.

LCCF is spreading its discretionary resources less thinly and focusing more on movements — such as the burgeoning arts community — that have community-wide

betterment potential.

"We're a catalyst" focusing on "tipping-point" opportunities, said Philip R. Wenger,

board chairman and head of the search committee.

The foundation expects to expand its \$67 million endowment to \$100 million in three years, Wenger said. It also wants to boost its visibility.

The foundation looked for a chief with a fresh perspective, powerful networking skills and the ability to translate donors' needs into maxi-

mum community impact, Wenger added.

"We chose [Bressi] because at heart he's an entrepreneur," Wenger said. "He's passionate about community building."

Bressi will head up the foundation's "Creating Extraordinary Community" strategy and its grant-making program to foster nonprofit excellence, "LeadWell Management and Organizational Development."

The 42-year-old Shamokin

native holds a bachelor's degree in corporate-based health education and a master's degree in business administration, both from Penn State.

An active member of the Rotary Club, he is on the board of directors of the Pennsylvania division of the American Cancer Society.

He has lived briefly in Connecticut and in Harrisburg and he previously directed the Susan P. Byrnes Health Education Center in York for 12 years.

Bressi said he left the center last summer to pursue new opportunities.

He comes highly recommended by York County leaders.

"I would say the Lancaster County Community Foundation is gaining a real leader in Sam Bressi," said York Mayor John Brenner.

"He was always very good to work with and very community conscious. I'm sorry to see him go across the river."

Susan Byrnes called Bressi a dependable, charismatic leader and said that she and the center she founded will miss him.

Jan Herrold, of York College's Center for Community Engagement, credited

Bressi with guiding the health education center from a startup to a "robust" organization that helps kids in York and Lancaster counties and beyond.

"You're lucky to have him," Herrold said. "Sam really does see the big picture. He's so well able" to inspire cooperation.

In York, she added, "He wasn't an outsider for long. I don't think he will be in Lancaster County either."

Bressi said he intends to make himself at home here.

"I see an up-and-coming Lancaster city," said Bressi, who added that he is already familiar with the county because his sister lives here.

"It's a good place to live," he said. Bressi plans to move into the area as soon as his daughter, Hannah Leigh, 15, graduates from Dallastown High School.

Bressi and his wife, Linda, also have a son, Justin Lee, a freshman at the University of Pittsburgh.

And two golden retrievers. "We're a dog family and a soccer family," Bressi said.

Bressi, who also coaches sports, plays the guitar, does home remodeling projects and runs marathons in his spare time, begins day six at the foundation on Monday.

The process of linking leaders from diverse organizations will go on from there.

50-acre farm in Millville. The second floor is dedicated to a display of a dozen or so of their inventive timepieces.

Rick Stanley then e-mailed Noel Poirer, who'd started in May as museum director, inviting him to come take a look. "I finished the train clock in 1998, but the other three weren't completed until 2007," Stanley explained. "A clock has to be a precision instrument, but it can also be creative. I wanted to make clocks people wouldn't expect."

"Vince and I are members of the National Association of Watch & Clock Collectors, and I took horology classes at the museum in 1996. So this exhibit has been a dream of mine."

Their clock-in-progress at the moment is a suitcase clock, which uses more than 20 suitcases and an old brass luggage cart found on eBay. Likewise, the school bell and well pulleys in the timber frame clock on display at the museum were bought on eBay.

"We look for the unusual," Stanley said. "The point is to get people to stop in their tracks as they try to take it all in."

"Most folks view clocks as not being fun," said museum director Poirer, a 1988 graduate of Warwick High School. "But they are. This exhibit is outside the norm of what's been done here in the past. It's a new way of presenting timekeeping. All the works are visible, which is pretty exciting. What I like best is the far-out aspect, the element of fun."

"It's a whole different perspective, both silly and cool at the same time," said museum patron Duane Hildebrand of Windsor, York County.

"There've always been novelty clocks," said museum curator Carter Harris. "They go all the way back to the 1600s. Some people like their clocks to do other things besides just keeping time."

"I have no idea why someone would come up with this," said Andrew Magloughlin, 11, of Mountville, as he watched

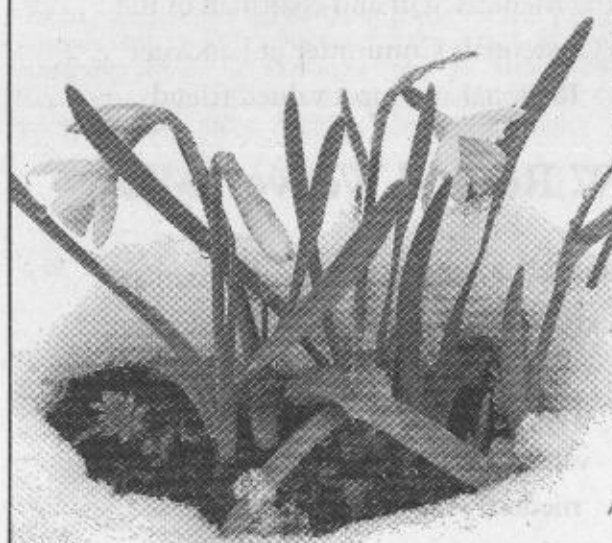
