Rt. Rev. Ronald H. Haines

The Rt. Rev. Ronald H. Haines, 73, The Seventh Bishop, retired, of The Episcopal Diocese of Washington, DC, who served as a bold agent of change throughout the Church as well as the steward of strong fiscal development and policy, died on March 21, 2008 at his home in Lancaster.

Bishop Haines was a tireless advocate for the ordination of women priests and defender of gender equality in the church. He worked to make the church and its leadership welcoming to people of all sexual orientations. Regarding racism as one of the greatest sins of modern America, he confronted it with passion. He maintained, nevertheless, that spiritual discernment could be achieved through the struggles and controversies surrounding contemporary issues. He listened as a pastor to those who disagreed with him, believing that people of good will and shared faith may differ but remain in communion with each other.

Haines served as the Diocesan Bishop of Washington from 1990 until retiring in 2000. The Diocese, noted for its diversity, comprises 94 congregations and the Washington National Cathedral, three Cathedral Schools with a total of over 1700 students and The College of Preachers.

Prior to becoming the Diocesan Bishop, Haines was elected Suffragan Bishop in 1986 and served in that role until the sudden death of then Bishop John Walker. Before coming to Washington, Bishop Haines served in the Diocese of Western North Carolina from 1968-1989, first as the Rector of St. Francis Episcopal Church in Rutherfordton, North Carolina and then as the Bishop's Deputy of that Diocese where he was responsible for congregational development, clergy deployment, program and budget.

He also was one of the founders of the Virginia and

three years, he was the Priest-in-Charge of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Manheim. He also was active assisting the Bishop of this Diocese and the Bishop and Diocese of Delaware with Episcopal duties of confirmation and ordination. He was well known as a friend and mentor of many area lay and ordained leaders of the church. In his retirement, the Bishop also became an avid runner, participating in many local races and half-marathons as well as a biker who traveled throughout the roads of Lancaster County and the South of France.

Bishop Haines came to the ordained ministry by way of a ten-year career in engineering. He was a graduate of the University of Delaware School of Engineering and The Mercer School of Theology (NY). He holds the M.Div and STM degrees from The General Seminary in New York as well as honorary doctorate degrees both from General Seminary and The Virginia Episcopal Seminary where he also served as Trustee along with many other organizations.

Bishop Haines was a First Lieutenant in the United States Army Reserve.

In 1956, Haines married Mary T. Terrell, who has been in residential Alzheimer's care for several years. He leaves six children: two daughters, Jennifer Haines Tozier of Advance, NC., Alicia Haines Pearson of Tacoma, Washington; four sons, Ronald Gregory Haines, also of Tacoma, Washington; Thomas Jeffrey Haines, Kittery Point, Maine; Jonathan Andrew Haines, Portland, OR; Peter Joshua Haines of Rockville, MD., and longtime friend and medical care companion, Erica Brown Wood. Bishop Haines also leaves 16 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

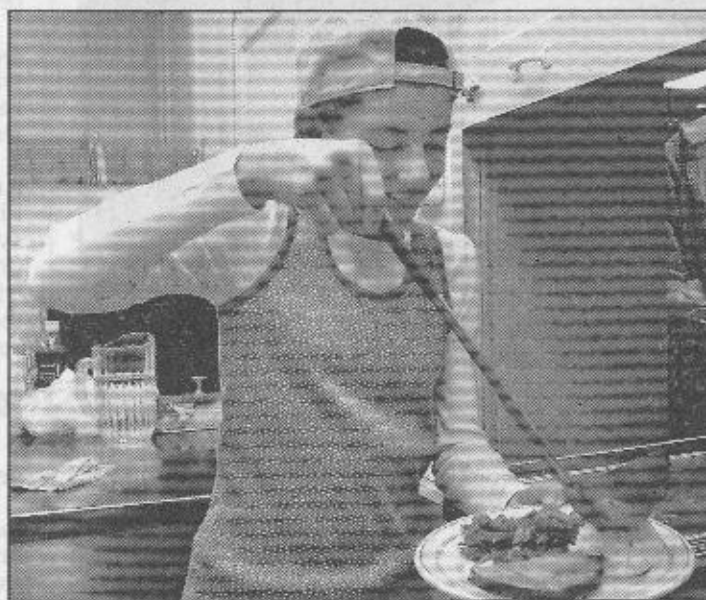

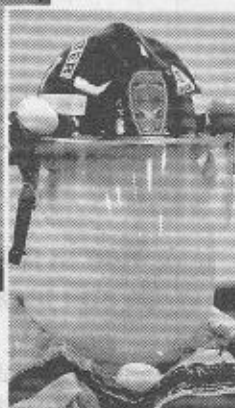

Warrington would also include 20,000 square feet of commercial space and would occupy 49 acres on the south side of Route 23, between Hornig and Hartman Station roads.

Coalition members contend

that the development would overload roads, stress schools and ruin the character of the area where suburbia intersects Amish farms.

Tuesday, they argued that the township should overhaul its ordinance before more proposals come in.

Tupitza called the ordinance confusing and contradictory, saying, for example, that it mandates a buffer strip but does not allow room for one.

He also faulted the document for failing to require consistent architecture, proper signage, adequate open space and environmental studies, among other things.

More than 40 people looked on as Tupitza clicked through a detailed PowerPoint presentation.

Longtime resident Earl Boudier, 69, of Creek Hill Road, read from a letter he and his wife wrote to the supervisors.

"Higher density housing will not by itself save farmland," Boudier said. Officials have no "duty" to "fill up the township with everyone that would love to move here."

Buckwalter thanked Stoudt for acknowledging the board's hours of volunteer service.

"We live here too and we have the same concerns," the supervisor said.

Smart growth strategies seek to curb sprawl and driving by promoting dense, mixed-use developments.

But TNDs have generated limited common ground.

Mount Joy has scheduled a conditional-use hearing Wednesday for a proposed 54-unit development in the eastern end of the borough.

Officials there have already approved two other TNDs,

472-unit Florin Hill and 73-unit Blossom Wood.

In January, on the other hand, East Hempfield Township supervisors bowed to fierce public pressure and axed a much larger-scale plan for 3,000 homes, plus retail space, at Harrisburg Pike and State Road.

It all moved East Lampeter Township businessman John Blowers to stand up Tuesday and question the fate of the comprehensive growth planning movement he helped spawn more than a decade ago.

"The pain of getting to the vision is what we're experiencing right now," said Blowers, who launched Citizens for Responsible Growth in 1995 after he became concerned about Wal-Mart's plan for four new supermarkets.

"We're not doing something right." ■

ing event for childhood cancer." In 2007, more than 18,000 men and women got their heads shaved at 402 events across the country, raising almost \$13 million.

Saturday, a new event was launched in Lancaster. Seven area barbers and hairdressers worked six bar stools in the big second-floor room of Annie Bailey's, 28 E. King St.

One guy went bald but saved his sideburns. Another coated his curls with green dye and found his scalp was still green in spots after the shaving was done. A third topped his newly bald pate with a green felt derby hat.

Begun in 1999 as a St. Patrick's Day benefit for kids with cancer, St. Baldrick's Foundation gives out research grants and fellowships to fight childhood cancer, a disease estimated to kill more children than AIDS, asthma, diabetes, cystic fibrosis and congenital anomalies combined. With the slogan "Shaving the Way to Conquer Kids Cancer," the foundation's signature shaving events are meant to show soli-

arity with everyone whose hair has been sacrificed to chemotherapy or radiation.

"What better way is there to show empathy for the children?" asked Jennifer Daisy, 52, of East Hempfield Township. Daisy is a regular at Annie Bailey's along with her husband, Chuck. Both saw the posters and decided to just do it. "Everyone knows this is a good cause," said Daisy, who works for R.R. Donnelley & Sons. She was the only female shavee.

"You have one of those heads that looks good without hair," cheered emcee Dennis John Cahill, a Rohrerstown volunteer firefighter and an announcer for WGAL-TV and Comcast SportsNet. "It's the new Lancaster look. Go ahead everybody, rub their heads for good luck."

The luck of the Irish — plus hard work, laughter and a few pints of Smithwicks Ale, Guinness Stout, and Miller Lite — resulted in a lot of camaraderie and an estimated \$10,000 raised at Lancaster's first shave bowl.

Bob Pennypacker, 51, bat-

talion chief of Lancaster City Bureau of Fire D Platoon, dyed his salt-and-pepper hair "Billy Idol blond" last weekend just to get it all shaved off Saturday. "I never dyed my hair before in my life," Pennypacker said. "This is all for Billy."

That would be William "Billy" Nonnemacher, 24, a Lancaster city fireman who survived brain cancer when he was only 3.

"My parents knew something was wrong because I kept falling over," said Nonnemacher. "So I had surgery at Philadelphia's Children's Hospital, and I still have a shunt from my brain to my abdomen. I've been getting my head shaved since 2003 at the York event, and figured Lancaster should have its own."

A 2001 graduate of Hempfield High School, Nonnemacher also volunteers with Rohrerstown Fire Company. His 21-year-old surgical scars became visible when his brown hair gave way to baldness.

"If cancer hadn't happened to me, I might not care so much," he admitted. "But it did. It happens to a lot of kids. And fighting it means a whole lot." ■
