1. GENERAL OBJECTIVES

The aim of the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) syllabus in Use of English is to guide the candidates in their preparation for the Board's examination. It is designed to evaluate the candidates' ability to:

(i) communicate effectively in both written and spoken English; and

(ii) use the English Language for learning at the tertiary level.

SECTION B: Lexis and Structure, and

SECTION C: Oral Forms

(c) Rhymes (including homophones)	iii. identify correct accentuation in individual
(d) Word stress (monosyllabic and polysyllabic)	words and connected speech.
(e) Intonation (words emphatic stress)

Emphatic stress involves the	
placement of normal stress on	
words in an utterance for the	
purpose of emphasis.
