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Concept of Tertiary Teacher Education

Aims and Objectives of Tertiary Teacher Education

Teacher Education Issues and Problems

Strategies for Improvement

2. Reform the curriculum:

Updating the teacher education curriculum to reflect global best practices and emphasise practical experience will better equip teachers for modern classrooms.

3. Attract and retain qualified teachers:

Offering better salaries, housing, and professional development opportunities will attract and keep qualified teachers, especially in underserved regions.

4. Encourage continuous professional development:

Providing teachers with access to workshops, seminars, and advanced degree programs will enhance their skills and knowledge.

5. Collaborate with international organisations:

Partnerships with global institutions can introduce innovative teaching methods and give access to international resources for teacher education.

Trends in Teacher Education

1. **Incorporating technology**: ICT is transforming education by training teachers to use digital tools and online learning platforms, which are now common in teacher education.

2. **Inclusive education**: Teacher education now focuses on preparing teachers to support students with diverse needs, including those with disabilities and from various cultural backgrounds.

3. **Competency-based education**: Programs are shifting towards models that focus on developing specific skills and competencies rather than covering theoretical content.

4. **Globalisation of education standards**: Increased international collaboration has led to globalised teacher education standards, aligning Nigerian programs with international benchmarks.
